<input type="checkbox"/>	Employment Contract or Job Offer	Clearly stating your position, salary, and start date. The salary must meet the minimum threshold set by the German government. Your job in Germany must enable you to earn a gross annual salary of at least €45,300.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Proof of Health Insurance	Demonstrating valid health insurance coverage in Germany.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Proof of Accommodation	Rental agreement, property ownership documents, or a confirmation from your host if staying with someone.

Additional Documents (Depending on your situation)

<input type="checkbox"/>	Declaration on the Employment Relationship	Often required by the Federal Employment Agency, depending on your profession. You can find more information here .
<input type="checkbox"/>	Recognition of Professional Qualifications	If your profession is regulated in Germany, you might need to have your qualifications recognized by the relevant authorities. You can find more information here .
<input type="checkbox"/>	Marriage Certificate or Proof of Registered Partnership	If joining a partner in Germany, provide relevant documentation.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Proof of Dependents	If bringing dependents, submit their passports, birth certificates, and proof of relationship.
<input type="checkbox"/>	Police Clearance Certificate	Depending on your nationality and background, you might need a police clearance certificate. You can find more information here .
